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The Options Process: Information for Parents

Dear Parent/Carer,

In September 2024, your son or daughter will be starting Key Stage 4 and will begin a two-year programme of study which will lead to a range of nationally recognised qualifications.

This booklet will give you information about the subjects that will make up this two-year programme of study. The separate subject booklet contains information about the different types of qualification which are on offer and the core subjects that all pupils must study.

Parents, pupils and school staff all play a part in choosing options. We advise parents and carers to take time to sit and discuss the information in this booklet with their child to make sure that the most appropriate choices are made.

The Y9 Options Evening in January will allow you to discuss possible Options choices and to meet teachers and course leaders from the option areas; including the vocational courses that take place off the school site.

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Advice for Pupils about Option Choices

Why the EBacc Pathway?

The EBacc Pathway has been designed for pupils who are interested in Maths, Science, Humanities and Languages, and some more practical subjects. It recognises the preferred GCSE qualifications for Post-16 and Higher Education progression including A-level and University study. In order to achieve the English Baccalaureate Certificate students must gain a grade 5 or above in English, Maths, Science, History or Geography, and Spanish (or another selected language). Please refer the accompanying letter for more information regarding the EBacc.

Good information is the key to making successful choices:

- You need to think very carefully about which subjects you enjoy and which ones you are good at.
- You need to get as much information as you can and ask for advice from your parents, teachers and friends.
- You need to think about your future career and your longer-term plans. Use the Careers Hub to help research which subjects are best for your chosen career.
- We hope that everyone will be able to take his or her chosen courses though we cannot, of course, guarantee this.

Please choose subjects because:

- You have thought clearly about everything.
- You have done your research, especially about new subjects and qualifications.
- You know what the subject and assessment process involves.
- You are good at the subject; you like it or have a talent for it.
- You have considered your best way of working (or learning style). Some pupils prefer practical work or work-related learning, some prefer end of course exams, and others prefer regular continuous assessments.

Please do not choose subjects because:

- You like or dislike a teacher.
- Your friends are doing it.
- You think that it will be an easy subject.

The Options Evening on **Tuesday 16 January 2024** will explain the Options process in more detail and help familiarise you with some of the new subjects.

If in doubt, ask for help and support from your subject teachers, your Form Tutor or a member of the pupil support team.

During the Options process you may receive a personal interview with a senior member of staff. Here you will have an opportunity to discuss your future plans and to look at what your current results predict about your future chances in certain subjects.

PLEASE NOTE: All courses, particularly those included in the GCSE and Vocational Options sections are subject to change as a direct result of governmental reforms. In addition all courses are subject to a minimum number for viability; a minimum of 15 students is needed in order for a group to run.

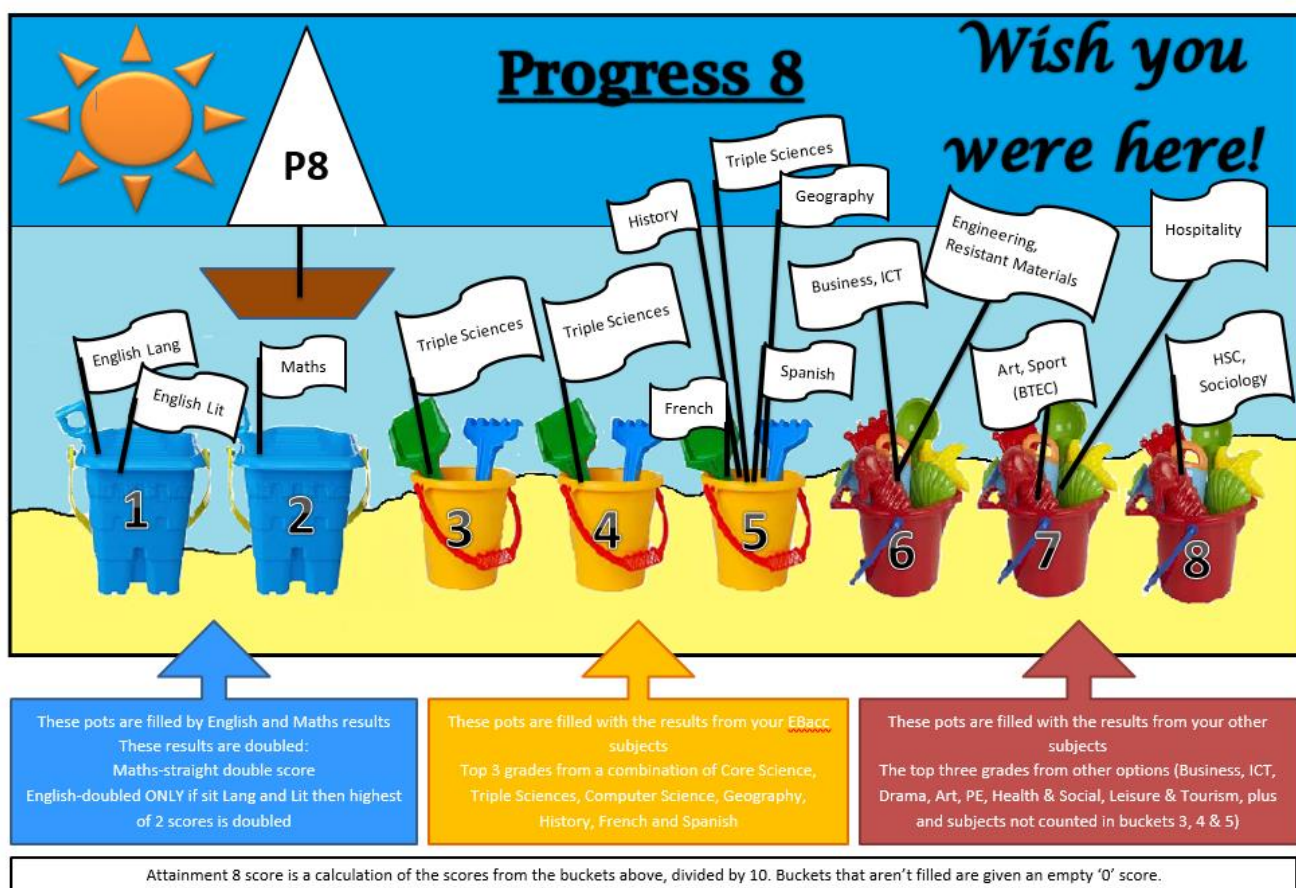
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GCSEs – The New Progress Measure Explained

When your child leaves school in 2026 the old progress measure of 5 A*-C grades including English and maths will no longer be the sole progress measure. A new progress measure, called Progress 8 will be in place as well. Progress 8 will measure the progress students make over their best 8 subjects studied at Key Stage 4. Pupils will leave school with a Progress 8 and Attainment 8 score.

In order to ensure maximum attainment for all of our pupils we have designed our curriculum so that it meets the Government requirements for Progress 8, for which there are 8 'Pots' to fill with 8 individual subjects. All students will therefore study English Language and Literature to fill Pot 1, Maths to fill Pot 2 and Triple Science for Pots 3, 4 and 5. Pots 6, 7 and 8 will then be filled with other subjects including 2 additional option choices as well as qualifications including BTEC Sport and ICT. The lower of the two English grades and 'unused' EBacc qualifications can also fill these pots.

Compulsory Core Subjects

All pupils on the EBacc pathway are required to study the following compulsory core subjects:

- English Language & Literature
- Mathematics
- Spanish
- Chemistry, Biology and Physics
- Core PE
- RE and Citizenship

Students on the EBacc Pathway will study Triple Science as part of their core curriculum.

Option Subjects

The table below highlights the range of option choices available for students in addition to the compulsory core subjects.

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Qualifications and Courses Explained

The qualifications offered at Key Stage 4 will give all young people the opportunity to choose a range of learning which motivates and challenges them, and which gives them the knowledge, skills and experience they need to succeed in education, work, and life. To achieve this, a variety of qualifications are offered which have different demands in terms of how things are learned and how they are assessed. All qualifications fit into a national framework understood by colleges and employers.

GCSE (General Certificate of Secondary Education)

GCSEs generally involve studying the theory of a subject which is assessed through an exam at the end of Year 11. Some GCSEs, however, may be a combination of coursework and practical assessments.

For students beginning their GCSE courses in September 2024 the numerical grading system applies. The table below shows the new numerical grades against old letter grades for comparison.

BTEC

BTEC qualifications are vocationally related qualifications which cover various work areas. These courses are mainly coursework based but will include some element of external assessment e.g. an on screen test.

BTEC Level 2 qualifications are graded at Pass, Merit, Distinction and Distinction* which are broadly equivalent to GCSE grades 9-4.

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Who Can Help Me With My Choices?

There are lots of people who can help you with the decisions you need to make. Your aim at the end of this process is to have chosen a programme of study that includes a variety of subjects relevant to your future aims and aspirations.

Remember to look at subjects that you will enjoy and have the potential to do well in. If you have strong career interests at this stage you will need to research what subjects you will need to enter that career. If you haven't considered careers yet, you will need to make choices that do not limit your career choices later on.

Subject Teachers

Once you have read through this booklet you could talk to the teachers of the subjects you are interested in and use the internet to research the careers and subjects you are interested in. They will be able to give you more specific information about the courses you are interested in. You will find all of these staff at the Options Evening Tuesday 17 January 2023.

Careers Leaders

Mrs Lake and Miss Grapes can help you to find useful sources of information on courses and careers in school.

Careers Advisor

The Careers Advisor in school can give you more details about Post-16 pathways that you may be interested in and advise you on appropriate option choices.

The Careers Hub also includes a wide range of reference material to help you make the right choices.

Post-16 Career Progression

You may or may not have started to consider the career pathways you are interested in. The following information may be helpful if you interested in planning towards a particular career.

As the competition for Post-16, Sixth Form and University places increases the option choices you make for your GCSEs can influence the options you are able to access later on in education.

The pathway table pulls together combinations of Post-16 subjects that are most sought after for particular university courses (as researched by The Sheffield College). You will find recommended GCSE course options linked to each pathway to help guide you in your selections. The UCAS website also provides useful information regarding career paths and higher education pathways and the subjects required from GCSE and Post-16 level.

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Progression Pathways

The table below highlights some of the recommended subject choices for different career pathways. The recommendations are based on The Sheffield College career guidance. They should be considered in conjunction with research into university and employment routes. Students will be able to gain more knowledge of career routes and relevant subject choices during their options interviews and at Options Evening.
