Teaching This spend was on Food supplies, equipment and revision guides.	£5,577.95	30/69 students are PP students and require food to be provided for them to complete the course.
		All -0.41 PP -0.44 Non PP -0.39 The gap has closed between pp and non PP students. Schedule a tracker that matches with the curriculum so that a budget for this spend can be implemented.
		Buy these revision guides in July 24 for the current year 10. This provision is important to focus home revision and improve standards.
		Part of the realignment of roles for LT to drive home learning. The current gap in PP to non- PP is -0.73. Seneca learning for English showed that PP students average score was 78% compared to 75% for non-PP.

		Science 52% of students targeted achieved better than DC2 prediction. 76% achieved a grade 5 100% achieved a grade 4 77% got better than the DC2 prediction.
